Tip to remember TIC principles...



Calm, Connect Remain, Respectful All, Aware of self / others Predictable, Patient Safe and Say

Life can be like a game of craps. Some of us "win big" and live a life filled with caring people. Others face many challenges. Moreover, like the roll of dice, you can't predict how a student will respond when you use a TIC strategy. Every situation is unique. However, the one thing you can control is you. You can control your thoughts, behaviors, and response to a student. Stay the course.

The gold letters in CRAPS² is to remind us to follow the Golden Rule.

- <u>Calm</u>: Stay calm and help deescalate the student.
- <u>Connect</u>: Build positive relationships.
- <u>Remain</u>: Don't give up. They may push to see if you will give up on them too. Maintain a positive outlook. Have faith that they can do better.
- <u>Respectful</u>: We are the adults so we need to give respect at all times. An apology may help rebuild bridges.
- <u>ALL</u>: All students benefit from TIC. We don't have to identify a student who has experienced trauma to use the strategies.
- <u>Aware of self and others</u>: Stay attuned to your thoughts, feelings, nonverbal reactions, and the things that trigger you. Remain in the moment. Pay attention to the student's non-verbal's and what they are saying. Practice perspective taking. Put yourself in the student's shoes. If you had the same experiences, same life, as the student would you behave differently?
- <u>Predictable</u>: Consistently reinforce rules and expectations. Let students know about changes (ex: substitutes, bell schedule, drills).
- <u>Patient</u>: Provide students with space if needed. Be patient regardless of the situation.
- <u>Safe environment</u>: Create physically and psychologically safe environments. Analyze surroundings and consider whether you need to calmly help the student get out of the situation.
- <u>Say</u>: Give students a voice (listen to them) and choices so that they can be empowered and in charge of their life. Ask the student how you can help and support them?
